DISCUSSION - WORKPLACE INJURIES HAPPEN

Stats Recap:

"in 2021 there were 18 Young Workers Killed in Canada" - AWCBC

"Every DAY in Canada more than 40 workers under the age of 19 are injured on the job". - CCHST

"40% of all workplace injuries happen within the first 6 months on the job" - Gov't of Canada

Teacher Question

Did the numbers of injuries and fatalities among young workers mentioned in Segment One surprise you? Why or why not?

Student Answer Prompts:

- Statistics are numbers, but each represents a real person with family, friends, loved ones
- One injury is too many and injuries are preventable

Teacher Question

Why do you think young workers are at risk for injuries at work?

Student Answer Prompts:

- New workers may be too intimidated to ask questions and be trying to make a good impression
- Employers don't always provide all the information and training a new worker needs to know before they start to work
- Young and new workers may be asked to do things that others don't want to do

Teacher Question

Do you know someone who has been injured at work?

Student Answer Prompts:

- Many will know someone
- If so, ask them how their injury impacted their life, their family and friends
- This will help them recognize that workplace injuries do happen and have an impact

DISCUSSION - RECOGNIZING RISKS

Teacher Question

Can you identify a risk you're comfortable taking frequently?

Student Answer Prompts:

- Texting and driving
- Jaywalking
- Skipping safety equipment at home or when playing sports (bike helmets, seat belts, gloves when working with chemicals)

Teacher Question

Consider why you feel comfortable doing something that is not safe.

Student Answer Prompts:

- You may think you can get away with taking risks because nothing bad happens
- It only takes once (like in Candace's case) for a life changing event to happen

Teacher Question

Does anyone have an experience to share that contradicts the 'it won't happen to me' mindset

Student Answer Prompts:

 Encourage students (or yourself!) to share a personal experience that proves that taking unnecessary risks can have negative outcomes
